8th Grade Math Syllabus

Welcome to the 2025-2026 8th Grade math classes. I hope you were able to relax and enjoy your summer break. We will use Eureka Math², published by Great Minds. Eureka Math² has a rigorous curriculum supported by integrating digital components to advance the accessibility and equity of the curriculum. I will be able to observe in real time what the students are doing and give instant feedback to correct instruction. Our goals as a math department this year are to increase student engagement, student discourse, collaboration, and movement in class. This curriculum will help us keep that focus. I am available every morning from 7:15 to 7:55 am if extra help is needed.

A typical lesson structure will have 4 phases and is timed to be 45 minutes in length.

- 1. Fluency (5-10 minutes)
 - a. Skills practice of previously learned material. Activates prior knowledge.
- 2. Launch. (10 minutes)
 - a. Introduction to the day's learning with activities to build context.
- 3. Learn (25 minutes)
 - a. Presents new math concepts to go with the lesson objectives.
- 4. Land (10 minutes)
 - a. Brief closing discussion for students to complete exit tickets on the day's topic.

For this to be a successful year we will need to work together and learn and practice various routines to help provide our class with an effective learning environment. This will require all students to actively participate in both large and small group settings. Be willing to share if called upon or if you have information to add to the class discussion. Lastly, it is imperative that we keep up with all work to have a successful year. If you are prepared and master the concepts in the lessons, the assessments will be easy.

Grading: Grades are calculated using the following weighted averages. The grading scale above will be used to arrive at grades. I will try to have grades reflect the student's proficiency level. An example of this would be a student who received 40% would normally receive an F, but that F does not reflect whether the student is not yet proficient or partially proficient. For assessments, I will take the raw percentage grade and use an adjusted score to calculate proficiency level and letter grade.

Notebook: It is required that we keep a spiraled bound single-subject notebook (70-200 pages). We will use the notebook to keep track of notes from activities and lessons, warm-ups, key vocabulary, and various other topics that will arise throughout the year. All entries are required to be dated and titled. A new date must start on a new page. You may write on both sides of a page or one. Grades are based on the organization and completeness of the notebook.

Independent Practice (Homework): Each lesson includes a set of practice problems (approx 7), that will be used as homework assignments or at times in-class assignments. Late homework or assignments will be accepted up to 2 days after the due date and will receive no more than ½ credit for the assignment.

Assessments/Quizzes: With each unit, there will be a mid-unit assessment (for longer units) and a final assessment.

Standard Quizzes: Periodically we will have standard quizzes to close out the week. There will be 2-3 key standards for these assessments. You will know at the beginning of the week what standards will be assessed so you can be prepared.
